Project Title: Secure and Trustworthy Cyberspace (SaTC)

•Funder: National Science Foundation

•Description: The goal of the SaTC program is to protect and preserve the growing social and economic benefits of cyber systems while ensuring security and privacy. The program welcomes proposals focused on cybersecurity education that: a) Improve cybersecurity learning and learning environments; b) Develop new curricular materials and methods of instruction; c) Develop new assessment tools to measure student learning; d) Promote teacher recruitment and training in the field of cybersecurity; and 3) Improve the diversity of the cybersecurity workforce. In addition to innovative work at the frontier of cybersecurity education, the program also encourages replications of research studies at different types of institutions and with different student bodies to produce deeper knowledge about the effectiveness and transferability of findings.

- ❖ Grant Writing Tip: The Foundation Center recommends thinking of a grant proposal as a story with a beginning (the need statement, which is the problem or opportunity you are addressing), a middle (your program or project, which is the solution), and an end (your outcomes or results). Don't lose funders in an illogical narrative filled with unnecessary data. Tell the reader right up front what you are going to do, who is going to benefit, and why they should care. Then, the evidence supporting the need should get to the local level quickly, and your solution should clearly and concisely address the problem.
